



Approaching Multiehnicity and Dementia in Education and Work

Project AMiDE first kick-off meeting was held on the 26th – 27th of November, 2019 in Aarhus, Denmark. Main aim of meeting was to get to know each other, make presentation of their institutions. In project are merged 8 organizations from four different countries – Denmark, Germany, Italy and Latvia. SOSU OSTJYLLAND are project main coordinators. P. Stradins Medical College was presented by Mrs. Dace Erkena, Head of Social Care Department and Mrs. Līga Priede, lecturer at Social Care Department.

The overall objective if project is to contribute to the improvement pf competences among teachers and trainers, who are educating and training basic care staff and to the improvement of competences among professional caregivers with regard to multi-ethnicity / multi-culturality and dementia.



Meeting in Aarhus (DK), 27.11.2019.

During meeting were organized discussions about tasks of each partner and general aim of Outputs.

Output 1: Workshops in each country with rep. from working place and education: Practices related to the challenges of multi-ethnicity and multi-culturality in care in general, and with a special view to the field of dementia. SOSU is the leading organisation.





This IO - where the main activity is a 2 days' workshop with staff members from education and from working life - was discussed in details and after group work in national groups, the partners presented their ideas for their workshop.

As a preparation to the workshops, each country (education partner and working place partners together) will carry out 6 -10 interviews. It was also discussed during the workshop with whom to make these interviews in each country.

Task of us as Latvian partners is to interview caregivers, relatives, doctors and psychiatric doctors.

Output 2: Development of a training program/training course/training material based on the results of IO 1. Development of a Teachers'/trainers' guide

Based on the results of IO 1, the partners will develop the training program and the teachers/trainers' guide. There will be some general modules/parts for all partner countries, however also some specific modules for each country. AWO will be the leading organisation of this IO.

Output 3: Development of a reflection tool for care givers. Leading organisation are we – p. Stradins Medical College of the University of Latvia.

Output 4: Piloting. Leading Organisation: DemensCentrum Aarhus.

The applied method will be the PDSA: Plan, Do, Study and Act.

Output 5: Awareness raising video

Leading Organisation is Giovani Valdarno Società cooperativa sociale. During first meeting partners exchanged ideas. Most partners agreed that the video must be simple, short and clear in its message.




at the centre where they had the opportunity to attend activities, to ask questions and to say hello to some of the users of the centre.
